Students, faculty, and staff of Kenilworth School District 38 deserve a learning and work environment in which their individual identity characteristics are valued and they feel safe and welcomed. The District has a duty to provide an environment that is free of discrimination, harassment, or bullying based on protected characteristics, hinders a sense of worth, or impedes access to a free and appropriate education.

The District works collaboratively to protect the rights of our students, staff, parents/guardians, and community members. The District must follow a number of state and federal statues and sets policies and administrative procedures in the areas such as operations, hiring, personnel management, instruction, student services, student conduct, extracurricular programming, and community relations that help guide procedures and decisions for ensuring compliance and protection of their stakeholders.

In addition to the Board of Education, the District Superintendent, and school administrators and staff, the district appoints individuals to serve as the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, Complaint Managers (of more than one gender), and a Title IX Coordinator.
